SPARK Impact	A KMb consultation and support service for child health and health system researchers, research networks, platforms, and teams in Canada, enabling access to KMb expertise, guidance, and support. Products, services, and supports are available to to all child health and health system researchers in Canada whose research study/program has health system implications. For relevant research supported through SPARK Impact, Children's Healthcare Canada (CHC) will provide a Letter of Collaboration or Partnership to include in a grant application. SPARK Conversations podcast miniseries (tentative name)	 This new podcast mini-series (Launched Fall 2025) will be Solutions- and healthcare system-focused Aimed at health, healthcare, and health system leaders and policymakers Sufficiently agile to respond to emerging issues and enable more comprehensive dialogues on solutions to long-standing challenges Delivered quarterly (or more often) on topics of interest to members and relevance to children's healthcare systems in Canada Each mini-series would involve 3-5 episodes (or more, if required to gain more in-depth perspectives on a theme area). 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Infographics	A visual representation of data/information to share key highlights of your research or program.	Infographics provide an easily understood and visually appealing format to share the story or summary of your research findings and implications for practice, health system leadership, policy, research, and family partnership. *meeting between CHC and research team prior to initial draft to determine the key messages and story to be told through the infographic. Up to two rounds of revisions via email or virtual meeting
Plain language video summaries (co-branded)	Brief co-branded video recording to share in plain language the key messages (for various audiences) of your research and their implications for children's health/healthcare practice, policy, system leadership, research, and family partnership/engagement Includes: initial meeting to discuss goals, data, story, key messages; storyboard development in 2 drafts, meetings to review drafts, final summary.	Plain language videos provide an alternate visually appealing and easily understood format to share your research findings and implications for practice, health system leadership, policy, research, and family partnership.
Policy Briefs	A concise (1-3 pages) document providing a brief analysis and explanation of policy issues and problems relevant to your research focus together with the policy options and recommendations for addressing those issues or problems.	Policy briefs exist to inform, persuade, and guide decision-makers by presenting a well-structured case for action on a specific issue. Its main purpose is to bridge the gap between research and policy action by summarizing evidence, highlighting the problem, and presenting options for solutions.
